



The North Dakota Petroleum Foundation's mission is to provide and support education and outreach opportunities related to the petroleum industry, develop and advance quality of life initiatives, and promote and enhance the conservation heritage of North Dakota, and advocate for the industry and its communities to ensure their voice is heard and respected.

The Foundation, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, was founded by the North Dakota Petroleum Council in 2018 to support our state and the communities in which we operate. Through outreach programs, scholarships and education opportunities, and environmental stewardship programs, we strive to help our neighbors make our communities better places to live, work, and raise a family.

The oil and natural gas industry is an economic powerhouse for the state, contributing more than \$42.58 billion to North Dakota's economy and supporting nearly 50,000 jobs. The industry also paid more than \$3.9 billion in taxes, royalties, permits and other fees. These revenues are directed toward funds used to fund specific priorities including schools, roads and infrastructure, the North Dakota Legacy Fund, property tax relief, wildlife and natural resources, and more.



The Lignite Energy Council is a regional trade association representing the lignite coal and energy producers and businesses that support the industry in the Upper Midwest that provide electricity, synthetic natural gas, fertilizers, and other goods and services.



The industry accounts for \$5.75 billion in gross economic impact for the state, \$1.04 million in local and state tax contributions, and more than 12,000 direct and indirect jobs.

Approximately 2 million customers in the region are served by the lignite industry's affordable and reliable power from North Dakota's six lignite-fired power plants.

North Dakota gets it right when it comes to protecting and maintaining air quality, after all, we are one of only four of the lower 48 states that have never violated federal standards that protect human health and the environment, thanks in part to the \$2 billion industry has invested in environmental stewardship technologies.

Also, more than 22,000 acres of mined land have been reclaimed and bond released in North Dakota, producing as good or better than prior to mining.
